Top 5 Values of MCEP

Legislative/Advocacy

Legislative and Advocacy issues are ever present and changing. To help stay informed and get the best guidance possible, MCEP employs a full-time, contracted lobbyist to navigate relevant legislative matters and ensure our actions will have direct results. In addition, MCEP has a robust legislative committee dedicated to advocating emergency physician and patients' best interests.

Education/CME

MCEP, typically, provides nine educational courses in a calendar year. The Midwest Winter Symposium and Summer Assembly provide, on average, a minimum of 12 AMA and AOA Credit hours each. Residents are also a big focus of MCEPs educational events. As they prepare to move out of residency, ensuring their education is of great importance leading to a wide range of resident-focused courses as well.

Networking

Helping to make connections is a vital part of MCEP's mission. Getting the right people in contact with each other to achieve mutual goals will only benefit the emergency medicine specialty. This drives the MCEP Board, committees and staff to keep up to date on who's-who on a state and national level and doing everything possible to foster these relationships.

Community

Conferences



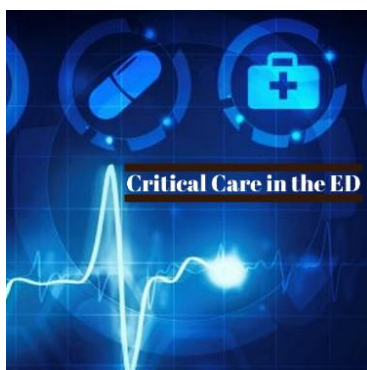
The Midwest Winter Symposium is a CME event designed to provide the latest information on the hot topics that affect your practice. Each year's agenda includes interactive lectures presented by local and regional experts and will also offer time for social and networking opportunities.

Typically held in late January.



The EMRAM In-Training Review Course is an annual preparatory course designed for residents to review core topics in Emergency Medicine prior to the ITE examination. The format is designed to address scenario-based questions similar to the in-service and board format of "the next most appropriate action" type question. Speakers are selected for their areas of expertise and teaching ability. Featured speakers represent several residency programs throughout the state. Attendance has exceeded 250 residents in the past representing emergency medicine residency programs across the State of Michigan.

Typically held in mid-February.



Wayne State University Department of Emergency Medicine in partnership with the Michigan College of Emergency Physicians, Henry Ford Hospital, Indiana University, and Medical College of Wisconsin sponsor the Annual Critical Care Practice in the Emergency Department Conference. The objective of this conference is to provide high level information concerning the management of critically ill patients. Previous attendees have described this conference as a "can't miss" event for physicians and residents of any field who care for critically ill patients.

Typically held in late March.



The EMRAM SIMWARS competition is an interactive simulation competition that allows teams of four medical providers to compete against other programs on simulated patient encounters. The format is "round-robin" for the first round. Each team will get to perform in 5 different cases – all teams will be judged for all 5 rotations with the top two teams moving to the finals. An expert panel will judge each team's performance in areas such as teamwork, communication, and leadership as well as medical management of the "patient".

Typically held mid-April to mid-May.



The Mini Mock Cert Course is a unique, no-cost offering aimed at helping prepare residents for the ABEM Certifying Exam. This course takes place virtually and is designed to follow the ABEM exam format. Participants will sit through three mock sessions throughout the day with a rotation of faculty volunteers. Following the completion of the course evaluations will be provided for participants.

Typically held in late May.



The Michigan Emergency Medicine Assembly includes a number of traditional sessions covering medical/legal updates, the membership's Annual Meeting, and leadership forums covering health care issues. Each year, there is a host of special educational programs assembled to provide opportunities for our specialists to increase their knowledge and abilities in several avenues of their emergency medicine practices. To round out the three-day event, MCEP will also offer the traditional MCEP Family Opening Reception, Golf Outing and Presidents' & Awards Banquet.

Typically held in late July.



The Emergency Medicine Career Planning course is an innovative course discussing effective job searching and killing it in the interview. Discussion on personal finance issues, entrepreneurship and innovation will be held with one of our EM physician leaders. In addition, an extended break is held giving Residents the opportunity to meet with a number of physicians & representatives from various areas of the state and country who have positions available at their facilities. This offers residents a unique opportunity to talk with several hospitals and physician groups at this informal gathering

Typically held in mid-August.



MCEP is proud to announce Can't Miss Pediatric Emergencies: the inaugural regional Pediatric Emergency Medicine CME conference. This will be a dynamic and essential learning experience you won't want to miss. The agenda is packed with hot topics in pediatric emergency medicine, presented by a lineup of renowned local experts who are leaders in the field. Topics covered will equip you with the critical knowledge and skills to confidently navigate high-stakes pediatric EM situations.

Typically held in early September



This \$straight Talk Reimbursement course offers valuable information and updates for emergency physicians as well as billing/coding professionals and group managers. These lectures are presented by nationally renowned faculty who are considered experts in the reimbursement field.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

This program, developed by the Michigan College of Emergency Physicians, will combine elements of mentoring, organizational education, skills, training and guided experiences to selected participants.

Between 4-8 participants will be selected each year. This is a competitive process, and the Leadership Development Team will carefully review each application that is received by the November 15th deadline each year.

Criteria: Current member of MCEP/ACEP, minimum of three years of membership in ACEP or EMRA, commitment to attend all LDP sessions as well as agreed cost sharing.

Highlights

The MCEP Leadership Development Program (LDP) offers participants informational sessions and guided real-world experience in the areas of political advocacy, education, and leadership. Participants spend a year on a leadership experience designed to develop skills to meet the challenges of emergency medicine; connect with peers and mentors; grow professional networks; learn to affect change; and receive feedback on their individual leadership style.

Program founded in 2007 under the direction of Robert Malinowski, MD, FACEP.

MCEP and ACEP Success: Many of our program graduates advance to leadership positions at both the state and national levels. As of mid-2026, the program has had 130 graduates. 13 of our 14 current Board members are LDP graduates with 5 holding officer positions, 32 former Board members, 12 Past Presidents, 11 Committee Chairs, 3 Newsletter Editors, and 7 Program Course Directors. One of our LDP Graduates is currently a member of the ACEP Board of Directors and another is the ACEP Council Vice-Speaker.
